## Compact Steering Committee Convenes First Meeting of 2009

Mayor Sheila Dixon's Red Line Community Compact Steering Committee met in February to begin implementing strategies outlined in the document initiated during her Red Line Summit last May. The Community Compact reflects the work of 300+ community representatives whose principles will guide decisions impacting environment and health, economic empowerment, construction, and transit oriented development. The work begins this month for the four subcommittees established around these components. The 40-member steering committee, created by Executive Order, is co-chaired by Danyell Diggs, Baltimore City Red Line Coordinator, and Muriel Praileau, Evergreen Protection Community Association. The subcommittee chairs are: Wanda Durden, Environment and Health; Carla Nelson, Economic Empowerment; David Scott, Construction; and Tom Stosur & Paul Graziano, Transit Oriented Development. The full Steering Committee will hold its second quarterly meeting in May.
